### COURSE TITLE: ARABIC - YEAR 1 (CERTIFICATE COURSE)

### **Target Audience:**

Absolute beginners who wish to work in Arab countries, read simple Arabic texts, watch films, or listen to songs and understand basic Arabic.

#### **Duration:**

2 Semesters  $\times \sim 64$  hours each (3–4 hours per week)  $\rightarrow$  Total  $\sim$ 128 hours

Methodology

Communicative approach integrating grammar with listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Focus on practical usage for daily life, work, and cultural understanding.

#### **Course Introduction:**

This beginner-level Arabic course is designed to give students a solid foundation in the language while focusing on practical communication. Students will learn to read, write, listen, and speak basic Arabic, enabling them to:

- I. Introduce themselves and engage in simple conversations.
- II. Understand and use common phrases in everyday situations.
- III. Read simple texts, such as short stories, menus, etc
- IV. Comprehend basic conversational (Arabic simple songs, films, or videos).
- V. Prepare for further studies or professional use in Arab countries.

The Course emphasizes on a **step-by-step approach**, starting from the Arabic alphabet and simple sentences, then, gradually building grammar, vocabulary, and functional communication skills.

## **Learning Objectives**

### **Semester 1 – Arabic Foundations (64 hours)**

By the end of Semester 1, students should be able to:

- I. Recognize, write, and pronounce Arabic letters and sounds accurately.
- II. Understand basic grammar concepts such as nouns, verbs, adjectives, and simple sentence structures.
- III. Read and write simple sentences correctly.
- IV. Introduce themselves and ask/answer basic questions.
- V. Describe people, objects, locations, and everyday routines.
- VI. Engage in short conversations using greetings, family, work, hobbies, and basic descriptions.

VII. Apply fundamental sentence patterns, including nominal and verbal sentences, definite/indefinite nouns, prepositions, and conjunctions.

# **Semester 2 – Expanding Communication & Grammar (64 hours)**

By the end of Semester 2, students should be able to:

- I. Use transitive and intransitive verbs in context.
- II. Express possession, past actions, and time-related events.
- III. Apply singular, dual, and plural forms correctly (including broken and sound plurals).
- IV. Form sentences in the passive voice and with common auxiliary verbs (e.g., Kāna and Inna & sisters).
- V. Ask and answer more complex questions using interrogatives.
- VI. Participate in practical conversations: shopping, travel, work, and social interactions.
- VII. Tell short stories, describe events, and narrate plans using past, present, and future tenses.
- VIII. Integrate vocabulary, grammar, and cultural knowledge into spoken and written communication.
